I can be of better help to clients if they tell me their emotional pain, distress, and suicidal thoughts. I want my clients to share their suicidal thoughts. If my clients share their suicidal thoughts and plans, I can handle it! Talking with Clients about Suicidal Thoughts and Feelings ... If you're worried someone you care about is having suicidal thoughts, the first thing you should do is ask them to talk about how they feel and listen to everything they say. Remember - you don't have to give them advice or say you know how they feel.

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Simply being there to listen can be a huge help. Instead, try to show empathy.
