

French Prepositions

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French Prepositions In French, they are usually placed in front of nouns or pronouns to indicate a relationship between that noun/pronoun and a verb, adjective, or noun that precedes it, as in: I'm talking to Jean. > Je parle à Jean. She is from Paris. > Elle est de Paris. The book is for you. > Le livre est pour toi.

Most Common French Prepositions

One of the eight French parts of speech, prepositions are short but essential words which are placed after a verb, noun, or adjective in order to indicate a relationship between that word and the noun or pronoun that follows.

List of French prepositions

Prepositions (les prépositions) are small words that link elements of a sentence together. They indicate the relationships between words. In French, there are simple prepositions (à, chez, etc.) as well as longer prepositional phrases (d'après, près de etc.).

In English, it is quite common for informal sentences to end in a preposition (though this is considered bad grammar), but in French, it is never allowed. Prepositions do not change its form. In French, the choice of preposition depends on the adjective that precedes it, not the verb that follows.
